

THE POWER OF A SMILE

The power of a SMILE is not to be denied. Indeed, cannot be denied. Did you know smiles are highly contagious? See one person smiling and pretty soon everyone in the room is smiling. Smiles are that powerful!

In our clubs there are a good many smiling folks. In our clubs there are a good many reasons to smile – people teaching people, people helping others, people sharing with others, people giving to others, and so on. Someone who greets the guests entering a meeting (you do have a guest greeter don't you?) for the first time plays a special part in a club. First impressions mean a lot. If the first impression a guest receives when attending a club meeting for the very first time is that of being greeted by a smile, generally a good first impression is made right then and there. I'm not suggesting that a club make their greeter their Club Rockhound of the Year...but a greeter does play an important part.

How does a club select their Club Rockhound of the Year? There is not any one single preferred method. I have seen numerous ones. One I saw recently was to have slips to hand out to all members. The slips of paper merely mention that this is a vote for the club's rockhound of the year. It has space for a name, a space to indicate an adult or junior, space for a reason why the selectee was chosen, and space for any other pertinent information. From those completed slips the candidate with the most votes wins – simple as that. No matter what selection process you use – whether that person is a greeter, field trip leader, program presenter, treasurer, editor, show volunteer or whatever criteria you use...it is good to reward those generous folks who do so much...even if it is "just" offering a smile.

Some items to have your selection listed in the pages of the EFMLS and AFMS Newsletters: 1. Prepare a brief (100 words or less) write-up of your member's good work. 2. Send that write up to me. It's as simple as that!

Some rules: (There are always rules, aren't there?)

Clubs are limited to selecting only one candidate per year (or two in the event of a couple).
In addition, clubs may have a junior member recognized as well.

3. When you send in your write-up, include the members name, the name of your club and your own name as the submitter. ANY club member may submit another club member's name!

If there is more than one submission, the first received is selected.

We would like to hear from you. We're sure your honoree will be surprised and very pleased.

This is one week earlier than our normal Labor Day dig, but it coincides with the eclipse that takes place on Monday night, August 21st. This area is supposed to be one of the prime viewing spots.

Tentative plans are to go to the Caldwell Stone Quarry, in Danville, KY on Saturday morning, the HWY 150 road cut on Saturday afternoon, to the McLure farm on Sunday, and the Phillips farm on Monday. It should be a very productive weekend.

The Caldwell Stone Quarry produced some killer fluorite and calcite last year. This quarry has been closed to rock clubs for several years, but we were able to get in last year with the help of our friend James Johnson from MO. (THANKS, JAMES)

You will need to bring crack hammers, chisels, safety glasses, steel toe shoes, and hard hats in order to get into the quarry.

A long handle four prong rake (tator digger) is good to pull out geodes from the creek and creek bank. Bring collecting buckets and tubs to put your prizes in, as well as something to wrap them in. Duct tape or electrical tape is good to wrap around the geodes.

Bring your food and drinks for each day as there is no place close to get anything.

All of the geode collecting will be in the creek beds, so come prepared to wade in the creeks. I prefer wool socks and tennis shoes, as the creek beds are sometimes slippery, and the wool socks will keep your feet warm, wet or dry.


