AMFS Code of Ethics from AMFS Website

- will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without permission from the owner.
- will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.
- I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.
- Tile will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.
- will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.
- TI will leave all gates as found.
- will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.
- Till will discard no burning material matches, cigarettes, etc.
- Tile will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.
- TI will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.
- I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.
- I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.
- I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.
- TI will cooperate with field-trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.
- will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.

2017 CVGMC Gem, Mineral, Fossil, and Jewelry Show

The Catawba Valley Gem and Mineral Club will hold their forty-seventh annual gem, mineral, fossil, and jewelry show on March 24, 25, and 26, 2017 at the Hickory Metro Convention Center. Hours are 9:00 a.m. till 6:00 p.m. on Friday, 9:00 a.m. till 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, and 10:00 a.m. till 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. Chaperoned school, boy or girl scouts, 4-H, church youth, day care, retirement home groups, and law enforcement officers and military in uniform will be admitted free anytime during this 3-day event. General admission is \$5.00 which is good for all three days. Children 12 and under are admitted free.

The 2017 show theme, "Dinosaurs + Meteorites = Extinction?" will be highlighted with a focal display and presentations to investigate the role of meteorites in the extinction of the dinosaurs. The display will include dinosaur bones and meteorites collected by John Sinclair who is currently curator of meteorites and minerals at Pisgah Astronomical Research Institute in Rosman, N.C. and by Ron Ruschman, a University of Cincinnati graduate geologist, dealer and collector who has also appeared on several television shows. Both men will provide informative sessions investigating the issues connecting meteorites and the downfall of the dinosaurs.

Added attractions at this year's show are displays by CVGMC member Richard Sipe of the world's largest carved sapphire at over 80,000 carats which is listed in the Guinness Book of World Records (Called the Sipe Sapphire). Another Sipe display, called "The Chief" is verified as natural ruby corundum, as identified by New York gemologists, which weighs 112 pounds and 6 oz. and 255,000 carats. It has a very unique design, thus the name "The Chief." A number of other educational displays will be available for viewing. The displays will include high quality specimens enclosed in glass cases.

Two education areas will be in operation on Friday, March 24. As many as 15 small group presentations by club members, geology specialists, gemologists, etc. highlight areas such as minerals, fossils, Indian artifacts, and gems. Public, private, and home school groups are invited to attend the show on Friday, March 24. School groups will have an opportunity to enjoy several different presentations that align with the curriculum of a number of grade levels. A second educational area will house a hands-on display where attendees are encouraged to actually handle labeled specimens and to study them with the aid of a magnifying lens. Club members will be on hand to assist in comparing texture, luster, and other properties of minerals and to answer questions. Demonstrations of the lapidary arts of faceting, cabochon cutting, and tumbling will also be provided by club members. An area with black lights will allow visitors to see fluorescent minerals. A special limited-touch area will provide an educational experience with fossils such as shark's teeth. Younger children will enjoy searching for free specimens in a mini mine. Participants are invited to bring gem and mineral samples for identification at a booth in the education area staffed by a geologist. Over twenty vendors will be on hand to sell during the show.

A special area will be in place where Boy Scouts may complete the majority of requirements for the geology merit badge on Saturday, March 25 from 9:30-4:00 PM. Chaperoned cub scouts, girl scouts, and other youth groups are also encouraged to attend and will provided assistance by club members.

Drawings for regular door prizes will be held every hour. Special door prize drawings will be held for school and youth groups. The club will be selling grab bags containing minerals and fossils for \$1.00 each. Geodes will also be available.

The Catawba Valley Gem and Mineral Club also has an education committee that will provide programs related to gems, minerals, and fossils in local schools and for various youth groups. An educational exhibit is also available for display in schools for a period of one to two weeks at no charge. Information concerning these services will be available at the gem and mineral show or from Dr. George Max, education chairperson. His phone number is (828) 328-9107. 


