
The April program will be the Bragging Rock Contest. The categories are:



A large measure of the enjoyment of our hobby consists of collecting in the field. For that reason, the members are proud to endorse the following:

"CODE OF ETHICS"

- I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without permission from the owner.
- I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.
- I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.
- I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.
- I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.
- —I will leave all gates as found.
- I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.
- I will discard no burning material matches, cigarettes, etc.
- —I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.
- —I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.
- I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.
- I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.
- I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.
- I will cooperate with field-trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.
- I will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.
- I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.
- I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of Rockhounds everywhere.

Abraham Gottlob Werner



One of the goals of Mini Miners Monthly is to teach you about some of the very important people in the history of mineral collecting and the science of mineralogy. One of these people is a German geologist named Abraham Gottlob Werner (September 25, 1749 - June 30, 1817).


Abraham Werner was born in the village of Wehrau which was in the country that used to be called Prussia. He was born into a family that was involved in the mining industry, so it is not a surprise that he grew up to be a geologist and mineralogist. When he was old enough, he studied mining and law. Eventually he served as a professor of mining and mineralogy.


In the late 1700's, minerals were not carefully placed into groups based on their 'properties. Werner had a great interest in 'categorizing minerals. Mineralogists describe his work in this as "the systematic identification and classification of minerals." To say it a different way, he wanted to create a system that every mineralogist could use to identify an unknown mineral that

was discovered in the ground.

Many mineralogists write many books about the subject. Mr. Werner did not. He had many students, however, that wrote other important books based on his teaching and who added their own thoughts to his work. One of these important students was Robert Jameson.


Many of the minerals that you know by name, and that you may even have in your collection, were named by A.G. Werner. Here is a list of just some of the minerals he named: Anhydrite, Apatite, Aragonite, Celestite, Chrysoberyl, Graphite, Kyanite, Labradorite, Leucite, Olivine, Prehnite, Pyrope, Rutile, Vivianite, Zircon, and Zoisite.
