The beryl is in a pegmatite dike and has to be broken out. The amethyst and smokies are alluvial and can be scratched out of the float. There is no digging allowed in the amethyst/smoky field. Cost is \$20.00. We can dig from 9:00 am till 3:00 pm. We will meet in the Roses' parking lot on Hwy 70E at 630 am. This is early, but the site is a 2 1/2 hour drive. To give us maximum digging time, we need to leave early. Bring you rain gear, food and water.

FIELD TRIP TO PA & NY MAY 8-12, 2015

The CVGMC has been extended an invite by the Central Pennsylvania Rock and Mineral Club to a dig in the Mt Pleasant Quarry & then go to the St Clair Fossil site. Also the Suffolk Gem and Mineral Club of Long Island, has invited us to a dig in their claim in the Herkimer Diamond district in Fonda, NY. The Margaret Hastings mine is where we will be digging.

At the Mt Pleasant Quarry you should be able to find calcite, wavellite, picture sand stone, and fluorite. At the St Clair fossil site you will find white fern fossils in black shale. There is surface collecting in the pit as well as digging large black plates of shale out of the banks and creek beds.

At the Margaret Hastings Mine (Also Known as the Ace of Diamonds Mine) you will be digging and hammering into bed rock looking for seams of mud or pockets with the Herkimer Diamonds (clear quartz). Do a Google search for Margaret Hasting mine and watch the U-Tube clips of other clubs mining. There is a jack hammer on site.


