NC Emeralds and Diamonds Featured

The Catawba Valley Gem and Mineral Club will hold their forty-sixth annual gem, mineral, fossil, and jewelry show on **April 1, 2, and 3, 2016** at the **Hickory Metro Convention Center.** Hours are 9:00 a.m. till 6:00 p.m. on Friday, 9:00 a.m. till 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, and 10:00 a.m. till 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. Chaperoned school, boy or girl



scouts, 4-H, church youth, day care, retirement home groups, and law enforcement officers in uniform will be admitted free anytime during this 3-day event.

The show theme is "North Carolina Emeralds." The feature exhibit this year will be Crabtree Mine Emeralds from Mitchel County and Hiddenite Emeralds from Alexander County. On Saturday, a display will feature the last verified North Carolina diamond discovered by Roger Grinnell. This Diamond was found in McDowell County in 2008. Ed Spear, internationally known geologist and Roger Grinnell will man a table with a microscope to educate visitors about diamonds and Club members and several vendors will provide outstanding displays of various precious stones from around the world for enjoyment by show visitors. On Saturday, April 2, Ed Speer, geologist will offer two slide show presentations for visitors. The first show will be presented at 1:00 p.m. and will feature North Carolina Emeralds. The second show will be presented at 3:00 p.m. and will highlight North Carolina diamonds.

An education area will house hands-on displays and demonstrations of the lapidary arts of faceting, cabachon cutting, and tumbling. An area with black lights will allow visitors to see fluorescent minerals. Younger children will enjoy searching for free specimens at a sand table. Participants are invited to bring gem and mineral samples for identification at a booth in the education area staffed by a geologist. Over twenty vendors will be on hand to sell during the show.

Drawings for regular door prizes will be held every hour. The club will be selling grab bags containing minerals and fossils for \$1.00 each. Cost of admission is \$5.00 which will allow admission for all three days of the show.

JUNIOR ACTIVITIES

Happy New Year to all young rockhounds – of all ages! Field trips are an important aspect of many clubs. While we mourn the closing of several popular sites and feel the frustration with increased access restrictions and policy changes brought on by changes in the management of local quarries, we need to search for alternative field trip opportunities. Hands-on



activities for junior rock hounds are vital to our clubs' missions.

Museum field trips can be interesting alternative to the popular collecting field trips. Museums typically only display a small portion of their collections at any one time. Many museums are also actively involved in collecting, researching, preparing, and curating mineral and fossil material. Both the undisplayed and in-work holdings are the center pieces of a museum's "back room." Most museum curators also appreciate the importance of gaining the interest of today's youth. Consequently, many museums are willing to forge partnerships with clubs and open their back rooms to junior rock hound field trips and special presentations. Many curators even show children how to handle and touch things, thus making such museum visits also "hands-on." Back room field trips are even exciting for the accompanying adults! In the spirit of partnering, clubs in return could also offer to help out their local museums through volunteering subject matter expertise as amateurs and even extra specimens to the museum. Though one might think that museums already have the "best" stuff, many museums long for local specimens and the stories of the sites that they help illustrate. If you're looking for programs for young rock hounds, consider forming alliances with your local natural history museum or even the geology department of a local university or college. The nice thing about museum back room field trips is that they can generally be conducted during less optimal seasons for collecting, such as winter.

Finally, let the junior rockhounds be part of the process. Help them to make contact and learn how to speak with curators. Curators rarely say 'no' to junior rockhounds and using the experience to teach them organizing and communication skills will prove useful for life, not to mention the jobs as future club officers!


