Minutes, April 12, 2011

The April 12, 2011 meeting of the CVGMC was called to order by President Baxter Leonard at 7:00 PM. There were 39 members and guests present. The minutes of the February 2011 meeting were read and a motion to approve the minutes was made by Harry Polly, seconded by Rick Glover and approved by the Club. (There was not a Club meeting in March)

Treasurer Report: Zan Ritchie reported that the checkbook and savings balance was \$17,065.97. He also requested that members, who gave out the white passes to the show, please reimburse the Club as soon as possible.

Field Trip Report: The April field trip will be to collect Kyanite at the Presnell Mine in Yancy County on 4-16-2011.

Show Committee: President Baxter recognized the excellent and tireless job done by the show's co-chairmen, George Max and Eric Fritz, to organize the amazing show that was put on this year.

George Max commented that 1,723 people came to the show. (966 show passes, 49 complimentary passes given out by

members, 415 free passes used, and 238 school children, teachers, scouts and leaders attended.) All but 30 grab bags were sold. He mentioned that the donation of the tables to the Hickory Metro Convention Center worked out well. The club will not have to store them, put them up and take them down and pay a rental fee on them at future shows. George mentioned the parking problems at the show, but it was mentioned that when just the gun show is on, there are the same parking problems. He asked Club members what they thought of the food concession and it was given a "thumbs up". It was suggested that maybe a Geology merit badge corner could be set up for the Boy Scouts to work on.

Eric Fritz commented on the exhibits and the job well done by all. He asked members to start thinking ahead to having an exhibit for next year's show. He also mentioned the possibility of inviting other exhibits from outside the Club.

Megan Russell made a suggestion for the Kids Corner to do a hands-on craft for next year and volunteered to head it up. She mention that when she helped out with the Buffalo Geological Society's Kids Corner the last several years, children used baby food jars, salt, and colored chalk to make a craft that imitated the earth's strata with the colored layers. This has been a popular event for the Buffalo Club with over 400 jars used at their 2011 show. She asked Club members to start saving baby food jars now for next year.

Education Committee: Wittenburg Elementary School in Taylorsville was visited by Glenn Bolick with 64 children and 3 teachers in attendance.

Unfinished Business: None.

New Business: Warren Hollar commented on treasure hunting in Alexander County.

George Max made a motion and seconded by Eric Fritz to make a \$100 donation to the Eastern Federation Scholarship Fund in memory of Linda Moser. Motion approved by the Club.

Zan Ritchie asked the Club to borrow the projector that was recently donated to the Club. Motion was made by Eric Fritz and seconded by Glenn Bolick to allow Zan to borrow the projector. Motion approved by the Club. Zan also mentioned that he has the *Eastern Federation Meeting* forms available.

Eric Fritz reported that the Club was asked to supply an exhibit at the Aurora Fossil Festival. Eric made a motion, seconded by Harry Polly, that the Club member that takes the exhibit to the festival be compensated for mileage. Motion approved by the club. Eric also mentioned he had various sized display boxes available for sale.

Announcements: Rock Swap, May 14^{th,} in Denton, NC.

May's speaker will be Dale Russell, a member of the Buffalo Geological Society, who will exhibit and discuss the collection of minerals of Southern Ontario, Canada and Western and Central New York.

Program: The April meeting program was the **Bragging Rock Contest**. Fine specimens were shown and entertaining stories were told. Winners will be announced at the next meeting.

MAY FIELD TRIP

Harry Polly, Field Trip Coordinator Due to rainy weather, there was not a field trip in April.

The field trip for May is to the Ray mine. It will be held on May 14th. We will meet at the LARGE PINK Quonset hut (home of the BBQ Man) at 8:00 am. This building is sitting on a hill on the right hand side of Hwy 321 North just past Caldwell Comminity College. There is no fee to dig.

You will need digging tools, scratching tools, buckets, food, water, collecting bags or raingear. There are no facilities. This will be a over **STRENOUS** 1/2 mile walk-in terrain. Material to be found here include mica, feldspar (orthoclase, ogliclase, and plagioclase), amazonite, tourmaline, beryl (common green and golden), aqamarine, columbite, flourite, and others.

Present rules allow you to SURFACE collect in the creek, BUT NO DIGGING!!! All digging must be done in the area designated by the USFS.THERE IS A LOT OF POISON OAK/IVY IN THE AREA. Please take precautions for this.



The AFMS Endowment Fund invests any money earned and uses the interest to help make some of the AFMS sponsored programs work better. Two programs that your club may be using are:

New programs are given to EFMLS each year for our program library. These programs are funded by some of the interest earned by *AFMS Endowment Fund* investments. In 2010, our library gained several new programs that your club may borrow to use at monthly meetings.

Many of our clubs have *Future Rockhound of America* youth groups. AFMS Juniors Chair, Jim Brace-Thompson has created an extensive program that EFMLS clubs may use for their kids programs. Participating juniors may earn badges to indicate their completion of various steps in the program -- and these badges are provided free of charge with monies provided by some of the interest earned by the *AFMS Endowment Fund* investments.

To raise additional funds that can be invested...and therefore provide additional services to clubs and club members, the AFMS has sponsored a drawing for prizes for the past several years. There are now 28 wonderful prizes that ticket holders may be fortunate enough to win when the drawing is held during the Awards Banquet at the Syracuse Convention. The good news is that ticket holders do not need to be present in Syracuse to win (but we hope that you will be).



Dogtooth Calcite is From Real Dog's Teeth

Many mineral collectors feel that calcite is THE most interesting and important mineral species. It is found in nearly every color in the rainbow (and some that are not, like black and colorless). It is also found all over the world in all three types of rock - igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic. Above all, it forms more unique crystal shapes than any other mineral - over 600!

Recent studies by my team here at Petros University have


led to the conclusion that one form of calcite, commonly known as

"Dogtooth Calcite," is actually real dog's teeth. All scientists know that teeth are a form of the mineral apatite (editor's note: please see the lead article in this issue, Mineral of the Month: Fluorapatite). Apatite is 5 on the hardness scale. Calcite is only 3 on the hardness scale. This has led us to the conclusion that when ancient dogs lost their teeth, the apatite in the tooth would chemically change to calcite. A mineral that has the shape of one mineral but its chemistry has later changed into a different mineral is called a pseudomorph which literally means false form. So, "Dog's Tooth Calcite" is a pseudomorph of dog's real teeth.

Mineralogists also study the forms of minerals. We have looked very closely and have determined that dogtooth calcite crystals really do look like dog's teeth.



Compare these



Late at night, if you listen carefully, you can hear the Dogtooth Calcite howling at the moon.

calcite crystal drawings with this drawing of a dog's canine tooth. You have to admit, they look very much the same!

Now that you have seen the evidence, I'm sure you will have to agree that "Dogtooth Calcite" crystals are pseudomorphs of the canine teeth of ancient dogs.

And if you believe this, all I have to say to you is . .
